Mr. Spann: We're growing and improving!

#### A FEW WORDS FROM STAFF ...

#### "Ms. Barkley: Reading and writing skills are essential!

"I'm here to help students strengthen their reading and writing skills, providing one-on-one assistance to any student who needs it," Ms. Barkley said. "Beyond fulfilling high school graduation requirements, English language arts courses help build strong reading and writing skills, which are essential in so many careers and business sectors."

"I like to get to know students' individual interests," she continued. "I think it's important that students have flexibility to explore subjects that appeal to them. It makes reading and writing so much easier when assignments center around topics they like."

Ms. Barkley believes that every Focus student is full of potential. "Our students are smart," she said. And so many are full of surprises. Take, for instance, Xavier C.J. who flexed his creative muscles writing a short story: *The Unknown Cabin* – a murdermystery set in the 1800s, earning him a unit credit in English II.

Where will Xavier's creativity take him in life? Who knows? Perhaps he'll write a novel or poetry. Maybe he'll author movie scripts. He

may become an actor on Broadway. Or perhaps he'll be an English teacher. Or maybe he'll use his talents in a field outside of the arts. Regardless, hopefully he'll take his experiences at Focus with him throughout life.



#### Ms. Caldwell: We're here to help!

As an intervention specialist, Ms. Caldwell's top priority is helping students succeed. Most students have at least one aspect of their studies that they find particularly challenging, and some find certain course packets a bit overwhelming.

"I'm always willing to work with students individually, breaking course packets down into smaller pieces and tackling them one-by-one," she said. "Different resources appeal to and resonate with students ... a tool one student finds particularly helpful may not be so for another. We have a wealth of resources to help students experience that 'aha' moment of understanding a subject they find particularly challenging."

"If you need help, just ask!," she continued. "Any student can come to me – and other teachers and staff – at any time. In many cases, students know much more than they realize and simply need someone to work with them one-on-one to master their most challenging course work."


#### Ms. Cline: I'm always looking for new ways to engage students!

Ms. Cline is super excited about Focus East's Spring art show – to showcase the creative work of Focus' talented students – which is in the early development stage. Students participating in her art class are wrapping up their 3D house and garden projects. Using Palmer clay, which is Ms. Cline's favorite medium, students created holiday "cookies" so realistic that Mr. Spann almost ate one! Next up is embroidery, which her students selected as their next project.

"I've also been busy developing a combined English/history course that I hope students will really enjoy," Ms. Cline said. "The two subjects are a good combination, and we'll be focusing on Black history, which students have expressed an interest in studying. It covers three standards for English language arts and three for history, with students writing essays on Malcolm X."

The cross curricular course replaces one of four packets in English and one of five packets in history, earning students ¼ credit in English and ¼ credit in history. Ms. Cline just finished development of the course a few weeks ago and is eager to make it available to students.

"I hope it's a great experience for them," she said.



Everyone's excited about the April 8 total solar eclipse – the first in Ohio since 1806! While many portions of the state will have the opportunity to experience totality, even those outside the path of totality (including Columbus) will see 95 percent or more of the sun eclipsed.

Students are earning credits for reading about it and tapping into resources available thanks to Focus West's science teacher, Dr. Black-Clay, who is one of only 100 teachers from throughout the U.S. to participate in the National Science Teaching Association/Space Science Institute Eclipse Partners Program.

"Our students have also been excited about a recent assignment that will continue in the coming weeks," Ms. Warfield said. "They're watching the news on TV, then choosing a story to research and write about. They're interested in current affairs, and 2024 is sure to be an exciting year with the presidential election."
